U.S. News & World Report names Grove City College No. 1 Best Value again; remains at top of America's Best Colleges list

GROVE CITY, Pa. - U.S. News & World Report has again ranked Grove City College the No. 1 "Best Value" in its category for the 2007 guide. This year marks the fifth year in a row that Grove City has been named in the top spot.

Grove City also remains at the top of the "America's Best Colleges" list among northern comprehensive colleges, listed at No. 7.

"New things are always happening on the Grove City College campus," said College President Dr. Richard G. Jewell '67, "but we remain focused on continually offering an amazing value to our students. It's gratifying that others like U.S. News regard the ideals of an affordable price and rigorous academics as highly as we do."

Grove City College is listed as one of the Most Competitive colleges in the nation by Barron's. In its category, Grove City College is also ranked by U.S. News & World Report as the No. 1 Best Value and remains in the top ten overall for best colleges in the region in the 2007 guide to America's Best Colleges. Kaplan has also called Grove City College a "best value" and a "hidden treasure" and Grove City College is a Princeton Review Best Bargain school. Founded in 1876, it is located 60 miles north of Pittsburgh, Pa. With an enrollment of 2,450 students, it is a private Christian college teaching the liberal arts, sciences and engineering. It is an advocate of the free market economic system and accepts no federal funding. Tuition is about half of the national average for private colleges.
